CLUB

At a luncheon on June 19, 1924, at the home of Mrs. Nina Egbert, plans were made for a Woman's Club of Meridian, and in July of the same year, at the second meeting, the club was formed, the name "OCCIDENT CLUB" selected, a Constitution and By-laws adopted--and so the Occident Club came into existence with a Charter Membership of 34 women of Meridian and vicinity.

A study program for the year was planned, and standing committees named. In the years that have passed the outlook of the club has broadened, bringing in other lines of work instructive to the members and helpful to the community. These have been handled by the appointing of other committees, till now we have a Press and Publicity, Building, Village Improvement, Child Welfare, Legislative, Entertainment and American Citizenship Committees.

This first year the Occident Club joined the District Federation of Women's Clubs, which has brought them in touch with many outside interests.

In celebration of the birth of the Club in 1924, there has been a birthday picnic each year in June at the home of Mrs. Egbert, and beginning with 1925, each winter there has been given a Husband's Party. These have been very happy events in the life of the Club.

The Committees have served faithfully. The Village Improvement Committee two years ago installed a drinking fountain in Meridian that has given much pleasure. They have taken active part in "clean-up week" and other interests of the town. They have had three fruit, vegitable and flower exhibits. Last Fall there were 78 vegetable, 33 fruit and 120 flower exhibits, and the children were keenly interested and took much pride in the show.

The Regislative Committee has reported on political platforms, explained proposed amendments, reported on proposed bills of especial interest to women, and also the failure of the Legislature to pass these same laws.

The Building Committee has accumulated a Building Fund and are investigating lots and buildings for sale that might make a Club Home.

The Child Welfare Committee has worked with the Girl Reserves, giving a Mother and Daughter Banquet, and helping them to raise their quota of \$100.00 each year.

The work of the Library Committee. The Library is the greatest pride of the Club Members. On July 17th, 1924; the first Library Committee was appointed. At the next meeting, September 6th of the same year, this committee reported that they expected to have cases of ooks from the Traveling Library in Meridian in a few days. These came and were eagerly read by the Meridian Children. Shortly after this the Members were asked to give a book to start a library, and from that small beginning the present library has grown, to between eleven and twelve hundred volumes. While there are orginarily three cases of books from the Traveling Library and approximately 800 books are taken out each month.

The Librarians, Mrs. Dan Barker and Mrs. Alice Mateer, have been faithful and enthusuastic against all odds, while their helpers have repaired books and helped to raise money to buy new books.

The past year the Librarians requested that this library be placed on the list for the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace. The request was granted and two months ago books were sent from the Division of International Course and Education for the beginning an International Mind Alcove when the Club has a building for the library.

Our first year as a Club saw our first efforts as a Civic Organization. Our first President, Mrs. Marian Clellen was the one to put forth efforts towards a public library. We first received cases from the Traveling Library which were placed in Songer's Drug Store. Mrs. Mertie Garrett: (now of Bremerton, Washington) acted as librarian one afternoon a week. The library was moved to the City Hall in March 1925. A concerted effort was put forth to get books by donation and raising money in various ways to buy books -- Mrs. Alice Mateer and Mrs. Addie Barker acting as librarians in 1925. M

Money was raised to buy a drinking fountain. During the Club year three dances were given at which they cleared \$105.85. The fountain cost \$76.55. Of the money left, \$25.00 was placed in a fund towards a Club House. This was our first money for our permanent home.

The first effort this year was to raise money for the Mississippi Flood sufferers. A call was made by the Red Cross, and \$127.00 was raised at a dance.

We sponsored a Bathing Beauty contest at the Fair, sending as our entry Miss Margaret Grondahl. She won the \$83.00 which was reported in library fund this year. During the previous years we sponsored a fruit and flower show by the grade school children. Also Girl Reserves and Boy Scouts.

We were notified by the City Council that we would have to find a place that for our library as we were out-growing our room, and there wasn't room for the Council to hold their meetings so we must plan a home in the near future.

Our work this year started with a request from the Secretary of the Chamber of Commerce that we take the painting of the band stand as our work, which we did at the cost of \$23.50.

In March, 1929, the Building Committee reported \$161.89 in the

Treasury, and at this meeting our first plans were made to definitely plan a Club House. Two places were condidered -- the Adams property and the old Interurban Depot were discussed. Nothing definite was done.

1929-1930

April being our City Election, the members voted to take an active part in this election, and nominated as their candidates Ralph Hosely and Charles Riddle. We won after a heated contest-this our first efforts in Civic work along that line.

This year being our banner year in real work and worry. Starting the year we voted to turn our attention and work to one thing, and that getting a Club House. The Building Committee were composed of

Grace Neal, Chairman Anna Hunt Grace Jackson Zelma Mathews Dora Leighton.

Too much praise cannot be given this Committee. Their accomplishment was far above anyone's expectations. They worked night and day to raise money. At our October meeting a vote was taken that we submit a bid for the Interurban Building, which we did and purchased it for \$1205.00. In order to hold property we had to incorporate, which we did in October 1929. Money was raised by donation, dances, putting on a Lyceum Course and an Idaho Home Products Banquet, which brought them \$109.42. Many donations were received. A play of local talent was one of the many entertainments. The Columbian Chorus gave us an evening of fine entertainment. A Style Show was given. The total amount of the building, finished, was \$1,955.65. This money was raised, excepting a small amount—that being borrowed for a term of five years.

The first effort of this year was the concession at the Fair, which brought us \$256.68. Work still continued toward paying off the Club nouse debt. One of the many things given was a Barn Dance, which netted \$50. \$60.00 was made serving lunch to Cremery Meeting.

Mrs. Barker made and donated a quilt that brought \$25.00 for the Library Fund. A Minstrel Show brought \$51.40. A piano, which was badly needed, was purchased. The many other things sponsored by the Club was carried on as usual this year.

1931-1932

June 24th, 1931 commenced our Sixth year's activity, and the annual picnic was held on that date at the Egbert home on their spacious lawn. A chicken pie dinner was served, with Mrs. J. W. Rice chairman of the Picnic Committee. At this meeting, Mrs. Brink gave a report in regard to the Kindergarten School that had been investigated and found not to be advisable at this time. At this time Mrs. Mateer and Mrs. Barker notified the Club that they were no longer able to work in the library—a position they had filled for six years continuously. They were given a vote of Thanks for their

untiring efforts, a record not many could or would make at this time. We decided to charge a small amount (10% and 25%) for Cards.

We again had a Concession at the Fair, from which we cleared \$118.36. Radio programs were sponsored over KFXD. This year the matter of a Cemetery District was discussed, and a committee of three appointed to see about getting it organized. W. B. Davidson drew up the petition which was circulated by Ruth Nelson and Mary French. Every one in the District signed the petition excepting two. They were L. W. Starkey and Mrs. Hawks. It was presented to the County Commissioners and according to Law, an election was held September 4th, that carried by a large majority. The extra money that comes in has helped to make one of the beauty spots and a Cemetery that we can be justly proud of. The first Cemetery board was composed of

1932-1933

1932 and 1933 will go down in History as the "Depression Year", and on account of it we decided to not try to make a showing, but just

try to keep going and not work hardships on the members, so there was no effort put forth to earn money. The most outstanding work which took two years to accomplish was the building up of the park around the blublinguse grounds. Mr. Petrie drew the landscape plans and the Committee, of which Mrs. Alice Taylor was chairman, and Mrs. Mabel Cairns, have been untiring in their efforts, spent much time and worked very hard, surely deserve special mention in this history.

Many trees and shrubs were donated which are all growing and blooming making a place we can well be proud of.

Another thing that has been taken up this year was the welfare work, as in the winter of 1931 and 1932 there was so much need for help. The Club named a committee to call the Church ogganizations of the town in conjunction with the Council. The chairman worked with the Welfare Board of Boise. In that way much help was given to the needy. The Red Cross allowed us to have a station and distribute flour and clothing, of which we received and distributed 350 sacks of flour, to 124 familes, two bolts of outing, one of sheeting, 105 sweaters, stockings, socks, overalls, cordurous, disper cloth, underwear for men, women and children, stockings, socks and bloomers to women and children and some beading.

MERIDIAN OCCIDENT CLUB REPORT 1933-4

The Meridian Occident Club was organized in 1924. The Club owns its own club house and a plot of ground which was landscaped and planted to shrubery and trees last year. This year the American Legion Auxillary planted a large poppy bed. There have been other improvements made toward beautifying the grounds.

We have a Library consisting of 2400 volumes in our club howse. The number is increased each year by purchasing several new books. This spring the Club

hired a CWA worker to mend the damaged books.

Our greatest aim this year was to raise money to pay off the mortgage on our club house. We succeeded in paying all but one hundred and fifty dollars. A great deal of the money was raised through the untiring efforts of the members in planning social activities.

On July first Meridian had a play day at which the Chub sponsored a beautiful flower show and sold ice

cream and cake. In 0

In October we held a carnival which included a fruit, flower, and vegetable exhibit. It attracted much atten-

tion and was free to the public.

Last fall we entertained the Girl Reserve Converence and housed and fed one hundred and seventy girls. We held a banquet for them and gave the girls half of the proceeds.

In November we held our annual rummage sale.

In December the Club sponsored a Home Products Dinner at which there was a good attendence.

In February the Club gave a dinner for the Idaho Power Company which proved to be quite profitable.

In April we had our annual plant and shrubery ex-

change which the community at large enjoyed.

This spring the Kurr Glass Company put on a meat

canning demonstration which was well attended.

Miss Minyard from the Extention Department gave a series of talks on dress making at the Club House last fall.

We furnished our club house to a group of CWA workers composed of sixteen women. The made over 729 garments and made 216 new garments and five quilts.

The Club sent fruit to the Children's Home, got ten applications for membership in the Red Cross, and assisted the schools in selling Christmas seals.


The Club members visited the Nampa Century Club and furnished a program.

Building committee made \$5.78 from a pie sale.


