"At a luncheon on June 19, 1924, at the home of Mrs. Nina Egbert, plans were made for a Roman's Club of Meridian.

Mrs. Mateer acted as temporary chairman of the meeting, during which Mrs. Marion Cleben was selected for the first president, and Mrs. Stanton secretary. Other officers were elected - Mrs. Beam as treasurer, being the only one chosen unanimously.

Mrs. Margaret Egbert and Mrs. Duffel, members of the Century Club at Nampa, were present and gave helpful talks on club organization. Elta Davidson favored the group with two vocal solos. In July of the same year a meeting was held at the home of Mrs. Mateer at which the club was christened the Occident Club. Committees were app-

ointed for the year, and
a Constitution adopted.

The Methodist church par-
lors served as a meeting
place for the winter meetings,
every member taking some
part in the interesting
travelogue of the year.

The club joined the District
Federation of Women's Clubs,
and sent Mrs. Marion Cle-
len, Mrs. Nina Egbert ^{and}

Emmett as delegates to the
District Convention. Mrs.
T. B. Brush, Dist. President,
was later entertained by
the club at a special meeting.

At this time, the first
birthday anniversary, the
club boasts of a library,
small tho' it be, in the
city hall. The book-cases were

"generously" made by the Manual Training classes of the High School, and books donated by the people of the community. Three cases of books from the State Free Traveling library are kept on hand. Mrs. Parker and Mrs. Mateer act as librarians two afternoons a week. Here endeth the first year's record!"
