

January 6, 1975

Occident Club meeting was called to order at 1:35 p.m. The Collect was read, followed by the Pledge of Allegiance. Inspiration Chairman Lillian Peters read a humorous clipping, "How do I Know (that my get-up-and-go ~~ADA~~ has got up and went)"

Four guests were introduced. There were twenty-three members reported present. Minnie Anderson introduced Mrs. Ruth DeMarr, who talked to us about the R.S.V.P. program. This is the Retired Service Volunteer Program, which operates under Federal Grant administration's Action program. It has 28% local funding and 72% Government funds. Mrs. DeMarr told us that Senior citizens' volunteers are needed in over 200 Ada County agencies. There is a special need for visitors in nursing homes. She suggested that we might establish a Senior Citizen Center, and mentioned the possibility that we might get our own transportation through the Office of Aging--Transportation. The Area Agency, Ida-Ore at Weisser should be contacted for help in setting up a Senior Citizen Center.

The Program was continued by the presentation of a number of readings and skits by a group from the Mid-High. We enjoyed them thoroughly.

Minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved as corrected.

The Treasurer's report was read and accepted. (attached). There were no bills.

Treasurer Bernice Jones was instructed to pay per capita dues by January 15, 1975.

Mary Alice (Secretary) asked for \$2.00 for stamps. A motion to grant her this request was made, seconded and carried.

Two letters were read, one, an invitation to attend Columbian Club's Social Day on Feb. 17, 1975, at 1:30 p.m. was referred to the next meeting for discussion. The other was a note of thanks from the Allan Ownbey family for a donation to the Occident Club memorial fund, from W.W. I Barracks # 1056 & Auxiliary. Mary Alice was instructed to see that the Auxiliary received this note through Violet Fisher.

Veteran's affairs--Marie Sandy submitted a report that no members of Occident sewed at the Veterans' Home in November or December, and gave a resume of recent bills passed by Congress to aid Veterans. (attached)

Library--Leona read the library report. (attached)

Emergency Loan--\$1.50 was received from Mrs. Davenport for use of crutches.

Program--June Thomas announced that the February program will be on the Heart Fund. The speaker will be announced. She suggested that all who wished to do so bring a quarter next time to contribute to the Heart Fund. The date for the Sweetheart Party will be set at the February meeting.


Att: During April and May the library was closed for remodeling and moving into the new part.

Report of Veterans Affairs Committee
Marie Sandy, chm.

Jan.6,1975

No members of our club sewed at the Veterans Home
in November nor December.

Some bills have been passed by Congress to help
veterans, following are three:

1. The Vietnam Era Veterans Readjustment Act of 1974
will increase educational assistance allowances
by 22.7 % for eligible veterans, wives, widows and
children. And by 18.2% for veterans taking full
time on-the-job training, flight training or
correspondence education programs.
2. The bill will liberize eligibility requirements
for disabled Viet Vets to equalize them with
WW2 or Korean Vets.
3. It will extend education benefits from
36 to 45 months and authorize direct loans
up to \$600 a school year to help cover education
costs.

February 3, 1976

President Mildred Hangle called Occident Club meeting to order at 1:30 p.m. The Collect was recited, followed by the Pledge of Allegiance.

Lillian Peters, accompanied by Emily Pratt, sang Somewhere a Voice is Calling as a Valentine inspiration. We all joined in the chorus as she sang If Your Heart Keeps Right.

Program Chairman June Thomas introduced her guests, Miss Julie Sorick, Field Representative of the Heart Research & Fund, and Mr. Pat Harwood, Cladwell, State Chairman of Heart Fund. They presented a film, Our Way of Life, showing what causes, how to deal with, and how to prevent a heart attack. The film emphasizes that our lack of exercise, poor diet habits, and work tensions all combine to make our lives very susceptible to heart attacks. Mr. Harwood gave a layman's summary of these problems of our working population. They distributed brochures of the Idaho Heart Association. Afterward, Miss Sorick answered questions. A collection for the Heart fund is to be given to Mrs. Cora Frymyer, who is in charge of the Heart Fund ~~Drive~~ Memorials in Meridian.

The minutes of the January 6 meeting were read and accepted as corrected.

The Treasurer's report was read and accepted. (Attached). The per capita tax of \$12.50, State and National, has been paid. There were no bills ~~either~~ other than automatic service charges.

Three letters were read. One was a thank-you from Nina Egbert for Christmas and New Year wishes. The other two were invitations to attend I.F.W. guest days, One at Nampa Columbian Century Club, January 10, at 1:30 p.m. Six members express interest in attending. The other at Boise Columbian Club, January 17, at 1:30 also. Nine members said they planned to attend.

COMMITTEES:

Hospitality reported twenty-five members and three guests present. Mrs. Daisey, who came as a guest last meeting was introduced as our newest member.

Public Affairs. Mildred deReus reported that Idaho will be represented in the wagon train moving from West to East for the Centennial celebration. The trek will terminate on July 4, 1976, at Valley Forge.

House & Grounds. No special report. There was a complaint that renters of the hall were careless about putting away the plastic tablecloths, and that the emergency Loan Closet was too often left unlocked.

Library Board. Leona Egbert read the Library report for January. (Attached)

The Emergency Loan committee reported donations to the Emergency Fund of \$10.00 from A. L. Brown; \$1.00 from Ethel Thorne; a \$5.00 and a \$1.00 memorial. The total was \$17.00

Safety. Edith Crockett reported on the recent government crack-down on certain tranquilizers, particularly vallium. She also repeated a warning about mylar and aluminumized kites which are dangerous if they come in contact with power lines. She underlined the danger of children having access to dangerous disinfectants and other corrosive articles.

Veteran's Affairs: Marie Sandy reported that three members of Occident have given 8½ hours of sewing to the Veteran's Home--a total of twenty-five hours. Her report is attached.

Cards & Flowers This report for December and January was given by Lena Bodine. Seven cards were sent. Report attached.

Conservation. June Thomas reported on suggestions by Heloise. Heavy cloth scraps like corduroy may be used to make knee shawls (about a yard and a half square. June asked for any scraps available. She also brought a garden gift of parsnips for all club members who would like them.

Education. Deane Ulmer gave a report on our new N.F.W.C. president, Mrs. Mary Catherine Barnes Miller. The article reviewing her many activities and interests was given to Historian Marguerite for inclusion in the scrap book.

It was decided that the Occident Valentine Party would be held on Monday, February 10 at 6:30 p.m. It will be a potluck. The committee appointed for this party is: June Thomas, Chairman; Lois Frazier, Nita Scrivner, Lillian Peters, Mildred de Reus.

The 1975 commemorative plates were shown. They cost \$10.00 and may be ordered ~~to~~ through Occident Club, which receives a \$2.00 profit on each sale.

The Program for next month will ~~be~~ by the Meridian Elementary School Mini-choir, directed by Mrs. Marcia Sandelin.

Some Federal Laws Adopted during 1974 to help the Veteran.

1. PL 93-289, the Veterans' Insurance Act of 1974, which among other things, increases from \$15,000 to \$20,000 the maximum Serviceman's Group Life Insurance coverage for in-service personnel and provides for full-time coverage for certain members of the Reserves and National Guard.
2. PL 93-295, provides disability compensation increases for some 2.2 million service-connected disabled veterans and dependency indemnity compensation benefits for over 300,000 surviving widows and children.
3. PL 93-337, extends from 8 to 10 years from date of discharge the period for Vietnam Era Veterans to pursue their education.
4. PL93-380, provides funds to establish Vets Affairs Offices on College campuses.
5. PL93-414, provides among other things, funds for V A Fiscal year 1975 budget of nearly 14 billion; funds for selective Service System on a standby basis; funds to continue the space shuttle program and for the American Battle Monuments Commission.
6. Restoration of funds, originally reduced by Senate, for development of the B-1 bombers.

March 3, 1975

Occident Club meeting was opened at 1:40 p.m. by Vice-President June Thomas in the absence of President Mildred Langley.

The first order of business ~~of~~ was the dedication of two new flags by a staff from the American Legion Auxiliary. The staff, consisting of Hannah Gage, Americanism ch. & Dedication Officer, Iris Kirkpatrick, Bobbie Latimer, Alma Barber, Cora Stewart, Ethel Hawkins, and Cecile Luke, musician, put on an impressive uniformed drill as they brought in the flags for the Occident Club and for the Library. The flags were accepted by June Thomas for Occident and by Mr. Koger for the library. We all joined in singing all three verses of The Star-Spangled Banner, after which inspirational patriotic readings were presented by Mary Alice White and June Thomas.

State President Erma Abbott was formally introduced and asked to address the meeting. She spoke in emphasis of the observation of our national bicentennial celebration, reminding us that we should take pride in being women in these United States. She urged Occident to bring its history up to date. Also, Mrs. Abbott gave a short resume of the rise of I.S.W.C. The first woman's club in Idaho was the Boise Columbian Club, which was organized to develop and furnish the Idaho Building at the Chicago Columbian Exposition in 1893. She told us that she became interested in women's clubs through the invitation and encouragement of our Emily Pratt, and paid tribute to her as "a very great lady". Mrs. Abbott was presented a corsage from our ~~Occident Club~~ ~~President, Mildred Langley~~. In conclusion Mildred deReus read an original poem in honor of Mrs. Abbott. She also read a short history of rivermen in Idaho, and showed us a picture of Idaho logging which she was to present to our library.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

The Treasurer's report was given and accepted. (attached)

The correspondence included an invitation to the Legion Veteran's Auxiliary Tea in support of Girls' State to be held at the Legion Hall March 15; a notice from Safeco Insurance, and a reminder of the Meridian Sewer election to be held March 11. The Insurance matter calls for an adjustment between Occident and the Library. A meeting is scheduled for March 6 at 2:00 p.m. between delegations of both groups and Jim Barnes of the insurance company.

Mildred Botkin presented a request for aid in financing two *indoor soccer* games for Idaho Youth Ranch. Action is to be taken at a later meeting.

Bills of \$2.00 to Bernice Jones for postage, \$3.40 to June Thomas for sugar, and \$65.00 for rewaxing the clubroom floor were allowed.

The library report was read by Leona Egbert. (attached)

House & Grounds: Leona Egbert reported that it would cost \$30.00 to \$35.00 to build a rack to hold the club chairs. A motion that we order this rack was seconded and carried.

Cards & Flowers: Lena Bodine reported that three cards have been sent. A card from Helen Bryce and Arnold Cairns was read, thanking Occident for the use of equipment during their mother's illness and enclosing a check as an expression of gratitude.

It was announced that that because of colds and other illness the scheduled program of the ~~Mini-choir~~ choir for this meeting had been

canceled. They hope to appear later.

Deane Ulmer called to our attention the debt of gratitude we owe to past Emergency Loan Chairman, Zelma Laworth. The club rose to a standing vote of thanks.

Emergency Loan@ Secretary Mary Alice White is to acknowledge gifts to Occident and to the Emergency Loan Fund.

It was moved and seconded that an honorary life membership in Occident Club be extended to Nancy Sage, who retired from the library on March first. Carried.

The resignation of Bernice Jones as treasurer was accepted with deep regret. Florance Hall was appointed to fill her term.

Oral Coleman, Edith Crockett, and Deane Ulmer were elected as members of the nominating committee.




Mildred Langley spoke of her pleasure in the past year. She repeated her invitation to all members and guests to visit her in her new home following the meeting.



Legislation to update U.S. Flag Code gathers speed before Bicentennial nears.

In March, Sen. Birch ~~Bayh~~ Bayh (Ind.) and Sen. Strom Thurmond (S.C.) co-sponsored SJ-Res.49 which seeks to amend Chapter 10, the U.S. Flag Code. Rep. Walter Flowers (ALA) and Rep. James R. Mann (S.C.) introduced an identical measure, HJ -Res.321 in the House where hopefully hearings may be set for late April or early May.

The Senate held hearings on similar legislation in 1974 and may be able to move swiftly on the question

The Senate measure will also be steered by Senator Hruska.

The Flag code was first enacted in 1942 and in the intervening years (though it was amended in 1954) has not been fully understood by the general public and even by many civic groups.

Flag etiquette, regulations and ceremonials are subject to confusion and varying interpretations. New regulations are sorely needed, especially with the nation's 200th Birthday coming up.




