



The sparsely-settled village the Burns moved to about 1891-92, was called "Hunter", after the man that promoted the privately-owned spur from the main line railway at Nampa. The private line to Boise was later purchased and incorporated into the system as "The Oregon Shortline."

Town Name Changed

An active, early-day fraternal group the Odd Fellows, pressed for a change in the town's name from "Hunter" to "Meridian". The geographical designation won out when Meridian was officially incorporated.

One of the first dances drew such a crowd that the sponsors had to wait until some of the guests dispersed to their homes before the dance could start. It is not recorded what the dancers did during the lull before the dance.

Mrs. Friedline has written a book "Generations" (Caxton), giving her family history in informal story form.

Three children, Waldo Burns (Oregon) Mrs. Frank (Elsie) Haasch, (Boise) and Mrs. Friedline. survive.

Pioneers Recall Early Days

Mrs. Pfost represented the Anderson family, and spoke of the trek made by her parents, Mr. and Mr. J. M. Anderson, across the plains in a covered wagon drawn by oxen, in 1876. Two small children, Nora (Palmer) and Will, acompanied the parents, and a third, Loula, was born the January following their arrival in Boise Valley, October of 1876.

Mr. Anderson was elected treasurer of Ada County about 1892. after a horse-and-buggy campaign. When his term was up he moved his growing family to a sage-covered 80 acres 11/2 miles north of Meridian. The family cleared and burned the brush.

He bought 10 acres from John Wilburn and erected a building on the corner of Broadway and Meridian streets. The first furniture store in Meridian, it is now the Legion hall, having been moved several feet west of the original

Mr. Anderson handled the first funeral supplies, and performed the customary chores of the modern mortuary. A coffin, as opposed to a "casket", was a narrow, tapered and unlined box.

Meridian Library

The Meridian Library is an organized library and belongs to the State Association of Libraries. It is open each Tuesday and Friday, and on Friday evening from 7 to 9 p.m. Anyone in Meridian or surrounding territory is eligible to use the library. The card fee is ten cents per year for grade school students and fifty cents for adults.

The Meridian library had its origin in the Occident Club. Years ago a few books were gathered together and kept in the Songer Drug Store. Certain days each week a member of the Occident Club would volunteer to act as librarian. Later the books were kept in the City Hall, and when the Occident Club secured its present building, the library was moved into lits present location and was so organized and indexed as to make it eligible to receive assistance from the city. It now receives a very small levy. The only other financial aid is what is collected from fines for past due books and receipts from cards of users. After the necessary maintenance charges are taken out there is practically nothing left with which to purchase books or magazines.

Due to changing conditions dur-ing the last several years, the need for such a building has lessened and it has been decided best to abandon the building idea. Instead, the money was to be used for some worth-while project or projects which would serve the community as a whole, and which would be of benefit to those who had supported the building idea.







Pioneer Resident Recalls Meridian 50 Years Ago

(As I was a lad scarcely five years old when I came here and as I am writing this entirely from my own memory I must ask some of those who were a little older than myself and whose memory might be a bit better than mine to please excuse any errors.

In November, 1907, the late P. H. Snow, who was the father of Mrs. George Thomas, had a blacksmith-shop where Henry Neitzel's garage is located today.

My father, the late Charles W. Ball, walked from Nampa to Meridian along the railroad track to

ridian along the railroad track to see Mr. Snow about a job shoeing horses and then walked back to Nampa along the same route.

The next day we moved into a little three-room house that was painted pink, located on the same property where Mr. and Mrs. John McNeff are living today. The folks were only looking for a place to locate, but as fate would have it they found quite a permanent location for me.

As I recall Meridian that day

it was just a village and a rather small one at that, of some 400 souls. It reached from where the Christian church is located on the north to where the Henry Carter's live on the west, to the old Atwater property on the south and a straight line from the Clayton Freytag's to the Carl Neuman's would very well describe the eastern boundary.

There was no city water system and no electric power service. There was just one block of cement sidewalk, from Kernen's Viriety Store to the Drug Center, all the rest were either board walks or just planks strung along. There were no paved streets and in the spring of the year the mud was knee deep (or deeper) on the tallest Indian that ever came to town.


As I can recall the older folks talking, the chief topics of conversation were: The sinking of the battleship Maine, the assassination of President McKinley and Governor Stuenburg, the Japs knocking out the Russian Fleet at Port Arthur, the San Francisco fire,

The old Bank of Meridian Ltd. was in the building that is occupied by the Elite Cleaners, but the only one I can remember as being connected with it is Howard Davisson.

Dr. C. L. Dutton had his office at the same location as the Rice Pharmacy but the building has been remodeled considerably since.

The space between the cleaners and the drug store was the scene of some of the happiest moments I ever spent in Meridian and which were eventually to come to the saddest ending. That was indeed an ideal spot for our games of "kid baseball" but after a very few years a man named Ed Mathews came to Meridian and of all places to put a blacksmith shop he picked our "baseball park".

The prints of the horseshoes are still in the walk in front of the Idaho Power office, I suppose, to stay there forever as grim reminders that our playground was gone forever. Sometimes as I pass by that spot I am rather happy that I am the only one of the old gang who must walk over those prints and be reminded, all the others are gone from here
