



The 50 early delegates, attending from Weiser, New Meadows, Cambridge, Nampa, Caldwell, Boise and New Plymouth, toured the air base in the afternoon. In the evening they attended a banquet sponsored by the Mountain Home Civic club at which Col. Brown was guest speaker.

Col. Brown said there are 325 civilian workers plus 3800 Air Force personnel at the base. The civilian payroll amounts to \$16,000 and the military to \$7,247,084 annually. The base has an estimated value of \$56,000,000 with an additional 50 million dollars under contract at present. This includes the Titan missile, Nike and the housing. There are 813 families living on the base. An additional 824 will come when the Capehart housing is completed in 1961, he said.

Col. Brown explained the location of the three Titan sites, how the missile is fired, its general description, the distance it will travel and how it is launched from an underground


