# Occident speaker tells improvements in treatment of mentally retarded

Occident Club members and guests were informed of improvements in treating and teaching the mentally retarded in Idaho Monday afternoon, when Wayne Farmer of the Nampa State School and hospital was guest speaker.

He noted improvements in the school, development of a foster homes program, and changes in everyday living conditions in the school. He cited more home-like serving of meals as an example; using proper silverware instead of just spoons.

#### New bus helps

The new bus has allowed a wider recreation program for many of the residents, including trips to bowling alleys. He mentioned new diagnostic techniques unknown until recently. Farmer said statistically in any given number of people three percent are retarded in some form. He said Idaho has between 18,000 and 20,000 mentally retarded in her population.

Mr. Farmer said the two most important needs for the development of the mentally retarded, even more important than professional care, are home-like environment and mother love.

In the foster home program, five or six people are being placed in homes each month with good results. The speaker said that many of the residents were put in the school years ago and deserted by relatives, who cannot be located. The new policy for admittance will not allow this procedure.





#### History of the Occident Federated Women's Club

On June 19, 1924, a group of women met with Mrs Nina Egbert to organize a civic club to help promote the civic needs of Meridian. Mrs Marion Clelen was elected President. She named her committees and put them to work. The Library Committee, on Sept 10, 1924, installed a Traveling Library, with six cases of books in Songer's Pharmacy. By November two more cases were added. By this time the club met regularly at the Methodist Church and had decided on "The Occident Club" as a name. The affiliated with the Second District Federated Women's Club March 8, 1925 and the Idaho Federated Women's Club in 1945. October 1929 they purchased the Interurban Depot for \$1205.00 for a club house. After repairs and remodeling, the held their first meeting Oct 4, 1930. The Library shelves were installed in the end of the club room, the members acting as Librarians. Later an addition was added to the building, which is now the Library and the Emergency Loan Closet. The Library grew to 7000 books: An "Idaho Book Shelf" of 65 books by Idaho writers, 33 adult books, 15 youth books were added from Memorials. A memorial rack of "Public Affairs" leaflets. There are 1228 registered patrons. April 19, 342 books checked out for the day - an average of about 2000 per month.

The Emergency Loan Closet, established in 1943, was prompted by wartime shortages, and over crowded hospitals, now contains everything from bed pans to hospital beds, 3 oxygen tanks and 6 regulators. Equipment loaned was used by 101 persons, with 138 pieces of equipment. Free will offerings were \$184.00. This equipment is available to Meridian and surrounding country and the patrons give what they feel able to give. A committee of three take care of this project.






