





News-Times editorial An important community problem

A growing community has growing pains. The Meridian city council was faced with this problem Monday night, when the Occident Club asked that the city take over the public library.

As the club officials said, the library has grown from a boxful of books to more than 7,000 volumes—and the book supply is still not adequate for our expanding community.

Just look at the figures — more than 25,000 books withdrawn the past twelve months . . . with the library operating only a few hours two days a week. Imagine the increase there would be if our library were operated as it should be for a community this big—a minimum of four days, preferably six days, a week.

Also, as the club officials pointed out, the library has been operating on a pitifully inadequate budget. The library budget from city taxes this year was \$1,035. As a result, only donations of books, time, and labor made it possible for it to be operated even on a two-day-a-week schedule.

Librarian Nancy Sage and other club members have put in an almost-unbelievable number of hours, at least five times the amount justified by the available salary fund.

The city officials did not dispute the statement that the club simply could not continue under the present arrangements.

None of us can dispute that, either.

Yet, as important as a library is to a family-community, a solution must be reached. The council has taken the first step toward that solution — scheduling a meeting with representatives of the Occident club. But they are going to need the interest and support of all interested persons to find an actual solution.

Several obvious suggestions comes to mind. 1) The almost inevitable need for an increase in the library levy, which is now only 1 mill. 2) The adoption of a sensible schedule of library-use fees for people who, like this writer, live outside the city limits of Meridian but whose families use the Meridian library. 3) The obtaining of information and advice from professional librarians, as to our library needs, the costs, the best way of raising funds, and other points.

To us who are parents, the importance of the library to our family—particularly to our children in school—is too vital for us not to take an active interest in this matter. Certainly our family, for one, is willing to be practical, and to assume our fair share of the library costs.

We hope all of you share this interest, and that you will support whatever action is needed to put our public library on a practical and adequate program of operation.
