Institute selects Meridian librarian

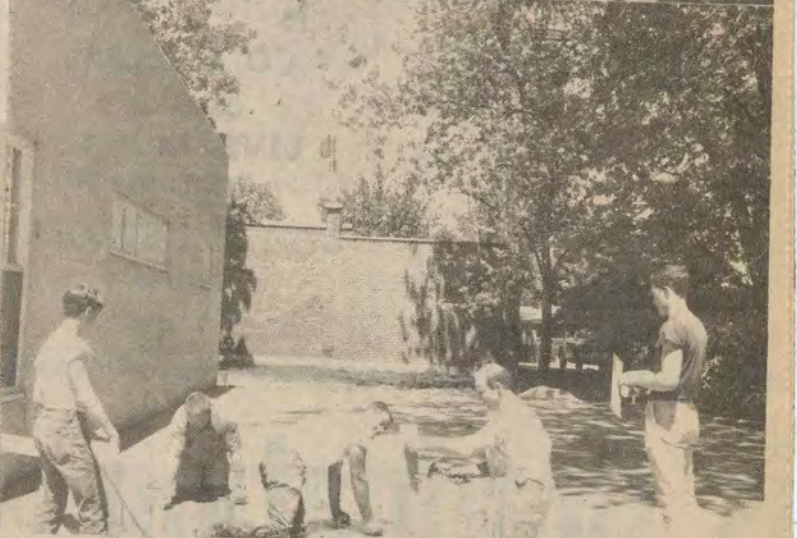

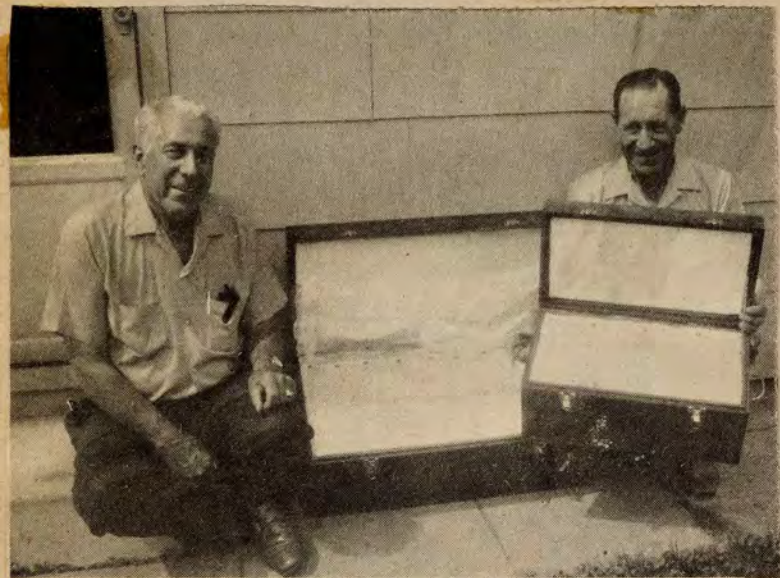
