Meridian Occident club is co-host for 72nd convention of women's clubs


The Meridian Occident Club and the Alexis Club of Boise co-hosted the 72nd convention of the second district, Idaho Federation of Women's Clubs.

Mrs. Mary White is chairman of the library board.


