

And may we strive to touch and to know The great common human heart of us all.



Gift Tree Planted – After 16 Year Delay

A white pine tree, a gift from the Idaho Federation of Women's Clubs, is growing on the U.S. Capitol grounds in Washington, D.C., 16 years late.

Back in 1959 each state was invited to plant a tree on the grounds and the Idaho clubwomen, in cooperation with the U of I Forestry Department, sent a white pine. It died before it could be planted. The late Sen. Henry Dworshak asked that another be sent. In 1962 three more arrived to be placed in the Arboretum until they became acclimated. The best was to be planted on the Capitol grounds. A

plaque with the legend "This Pine Tree Planted by the Idaho Federation of Women's Clubs" accompanied the gift.

Last year, when the office of Sen. James McClure was being cleaned, someone found the plaque, investigated and discovered none of the three 1962 trees had been planted.

So this summer Sen.
McClure made arrangements for another planting
and he took part in the ceremony, while Mrs. James Abbott of Swan Lake, current
Idaho Federation president,
was in Washington. Mrs.
Lionel Dean of Twin Falls
also was present.







Activity doubles Meridian public library gains patrons, use, books and staff

Meridian librarian Grove Koger said library activity has been increasing ever since the Meridian public library moved into its new quarters in June, 1974.

In a little more than a year since the present facility opened its doors, said Koger, 900 new patrons have taken out cards, more than doubling the number of active readers.

Of the new patrons, half live within the library district and half within the city of Meridian. As a result, circulation has climbed averaging more than 3,500 items per month this summer.

New building

The new building, housing the Meridian public library, was the result of years of work by the Occident Club and librarian Nancy Sage. It was also made possible by numerous donations from groups and individuals.

Since last August, the Meridian Free Library District has shared the library facilities, with the Occident Club donating that use without

Marie Sandy is the librarian for the city library, sponsored by the Occident Club. Grove Koger is librarian for the new library district, assisted by Nancy Spear.

Nearly 1,000 new books have been added during the past year, a number of them purchased with grant money secured by the district. Grant funds have also enabled the district to purchase several pieces of
