## Books to sell by the inch in Meridian sale this fall

Do you have a shelf of paperback books you've read that you want to get rid of, but still don't want to throw them away?

Or do you need a good book to read but refuse to pay \$10.95 for one?

The Meridian Library District is planning a book sale this fall that can solve both problems, says librarian Eleanor Arndt.

The library is donating old books it cannot longer use and duplicate copies of other books for the sale. It is also asking local residents to bring by books they no longer want, either paperbacks or hardcovers. Both kinds of books will be sold at the sale. A firm date hasn't been set yet, she said.

A collection box is in the library now, for books people bring by. The box will stay there throughout the summer as the library collects books for the fall sale.

Mrs. Arndt said phonograph

records would also be sold if any are donated.

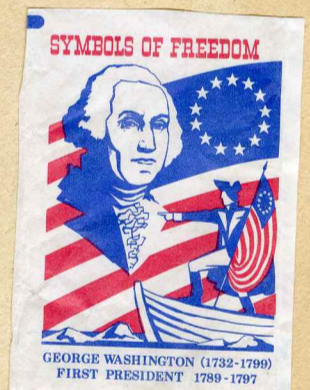
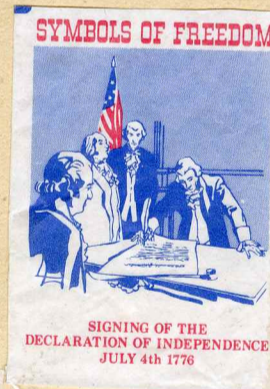
"I think we will try something I don't think has been done around here before," she explained. "We will sell the books by the inch. You select a stack of books you want to buy and we'll measure them to add up your bill."

The price per inch hasn't been set, she said.

Money from the used book sale will be used to buy new books for the library district which serves Meridian as well as some county areas.

The sale will allow the library to clear unneeded books from its shelves and use the money to replace them with a newer collections.

Mrs. Arndt said some people might be concerned that the library is selling some of its older books, but she explained that the ones being sold would be outdated for most library users.

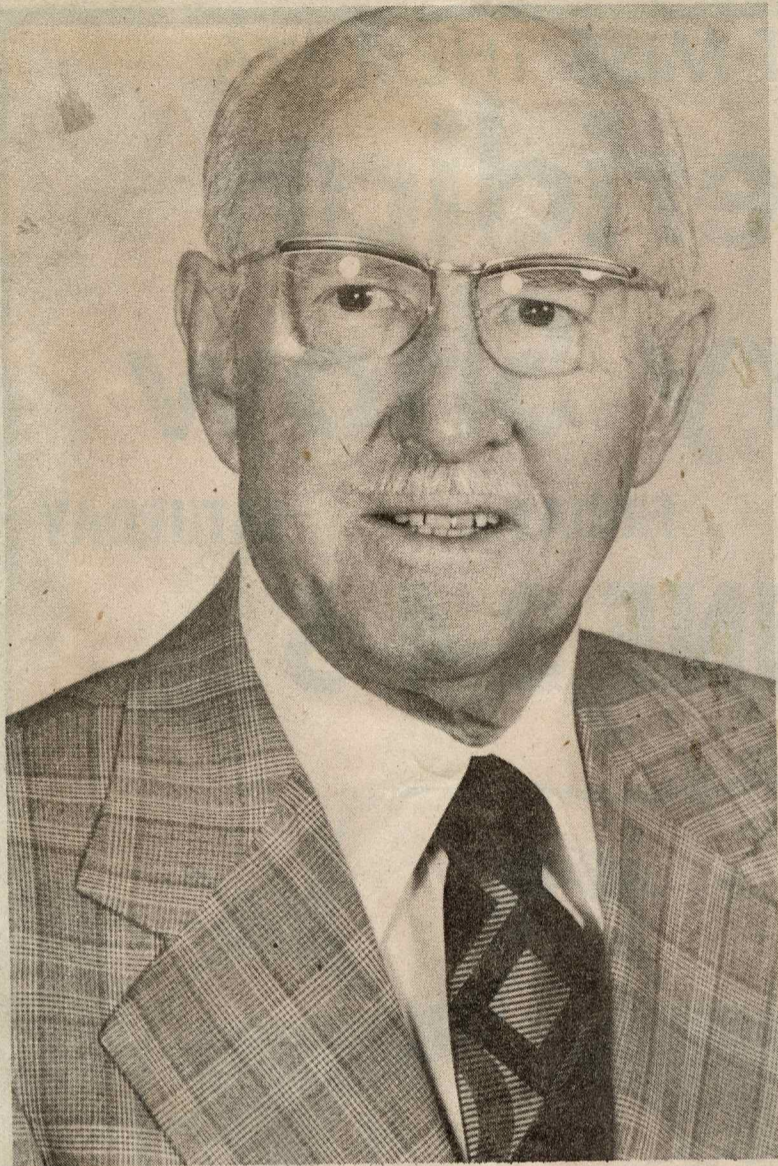

Thomas practiced medicine in Meridian from the year of his graduation from Rush Medical of

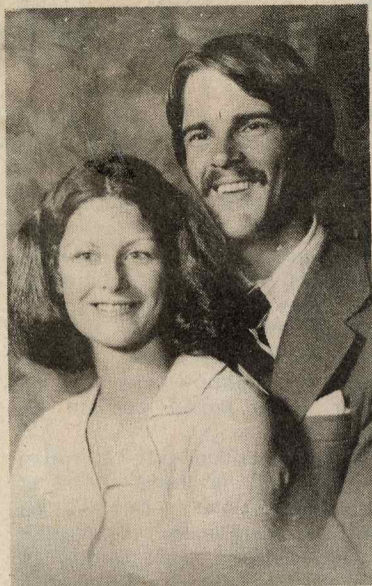
the University of Chicago in 1937, until he and his family moved to Boise in 1949. He has been a physician there until he suffered a recent heart attack.

Her grandsons served as pallbearers.

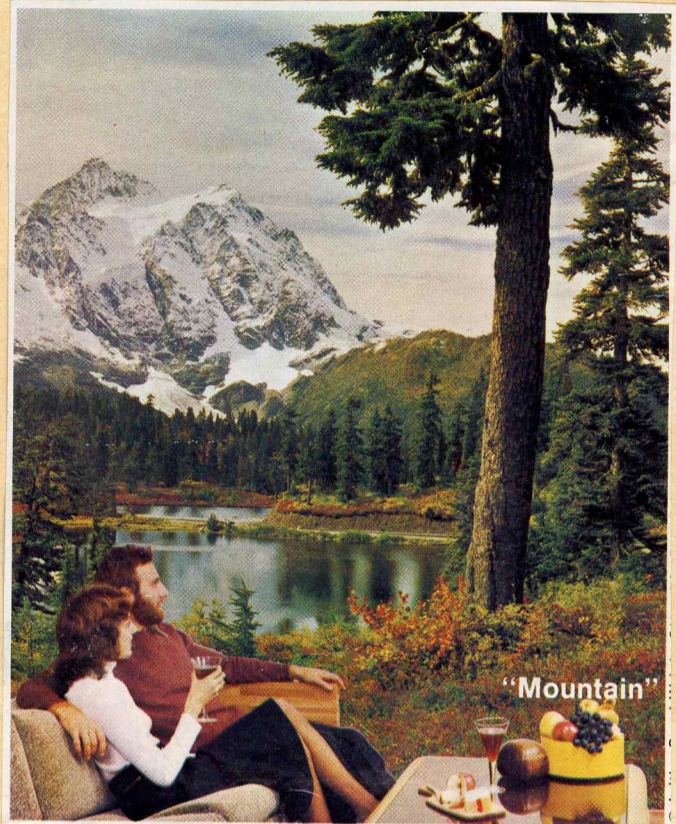

Requiem Mass was celebrated at 10 a.m. Wednesday at St. John's Cathedral, Boise. Interment was in the St. John's section of Morris Hill Cemetery, Boise.

He was born Jan. 28, 1920, in Boise.

He graduated from Boise High School after his parents moved from Meridian to Boise, when his father became Ada County sheriff. He attended Boise Junior College and the College of Idaho. He was owner and manager of the Meridian Cigar Store. He lived in Meridian until 1957 when he moved to Santa Barbara. He worked for the Postal Service in Santa Barbara for the past 18 years. He married Julia Uberuaga July 12, 1975, in Boise.

He was a member of the Catholic Church, a veteran of World War II

and was in the first ferrying command in the China-Burma-India Theater. He was the first commander of the Veterans of Foreign Wars Post in Meridian. He was a 29-year member of the Boise Elks Lodge, No. 310.

25 cents per vertical inch, while magazines and pocketbooks will be on sale for 15 cents per inch.

Proceeds will go towards funding new volumes for the library, she added.

## Gannett to Award 17 Groups \$63,878

Grants totaling \$63,878 will be made to 17 area non-profit organizations by the Frank E. Gannett Newspaper Foundation, Inc. of Rochester, N.Y., it was announced today by Robert B. Miller Jr., publisher of The Idaho Statesman.

"I am most flattered the Foundation continues to be so generous in our circulation area. This raises total contributions to \$204,678 since The Statesman joined the Gannett Group of newspapers in 1971," Miller said.

It is the largest number of grants ever awarded at one time in one location by the Foundation, said John A. Scott, president of the Foundation and a former publisher of The Statesman.

"This is a clear demonstration of the broad range of community causes supported by the Gannett Foundation," Scott said. "We appreciate the opportunity to be a good citizen in The Statesman area."

The Gannett Foundation has made five previous grants in Idaho this

year, including \$50,000 to victims of the Teton flood, Miller noted.

Named for the founder of Gannett newspapers, now a group of 54 dailies in 18 states and on the island of Guam, the Foundation has awarded more than \$33 million in cash or Gannett Company stock since 1937.

The contributions have been for charitable, civic and cultural purposes, education and health with the concentration in Gannett newspaper markets. About \$8 million has been awarded for journalism education.

Grant checks will be presented in October to the following organizations:

- Ada County Medical Evaluation & Referral Clinic, Inc (evaluates and refers people to proper medical authorities), \$4,983 (furnishings, clerical and medical equipment).

- Boise Hot Line (provides immediate help in crisis situations), \$3,409.23 (emergency kit, office furnishings and equipment).

- Nampa Area United Way, \$900 (copy machine).

- Booth Memorial Home (a Salvation Army facility for unwed mothers), \$874 (copy and adding machines).

- United Way of Ada County Administrative Offices, \$7,144.70 (office equipment and audio/visual equipment).

- Canyon County Information &

Referral Service, \$2,832 (funding for half-time Reassurance aide).

- Meridian Free Library District, \$1,500 (copy machine and shelving).

- Occident Club in Meridian to boost its Emergency Loan Closet which makes nursing and hospital equipment available to homes at no charge, \$1,000 (for mattresses and wheel chairs)

- Idaho Association for Physically Handicapped Adults, \$5,205 (funding to operate service vehicle).

- Vocational-Technical Learning Center at BSU (provides structured English program for Vietnamese refugees and other foreign born people in the Boise area), \$11,250 (two year funding for instructors in Intensive English).

- Plantation Attention Home in Canyon County (provides lodging and counseling for runaway minors), \$1,500 (funding for operating expenses and addition to the home).

participated in many other civic activities.

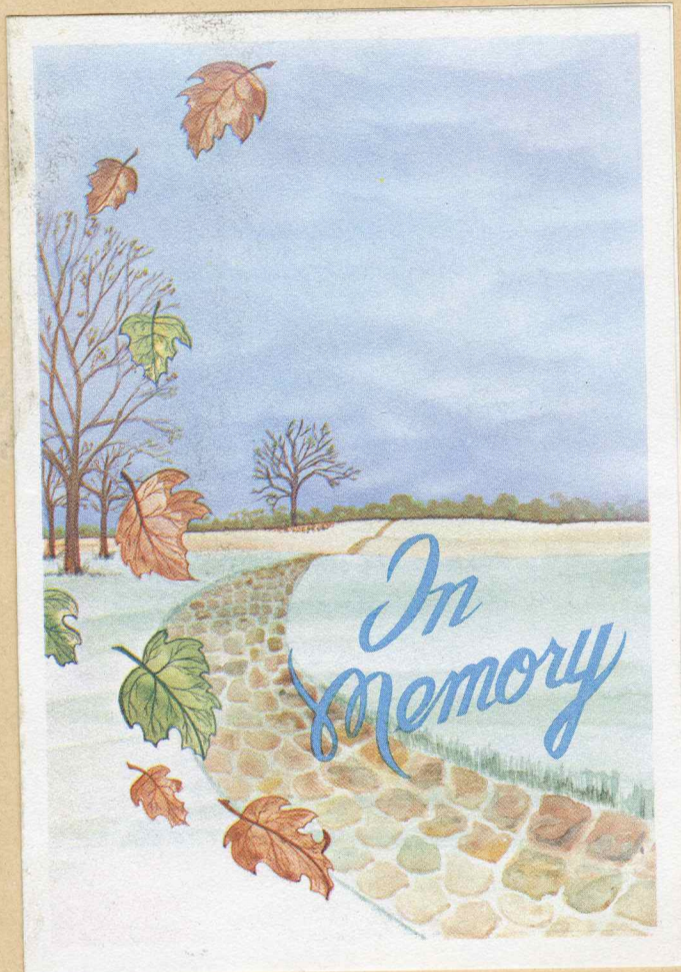

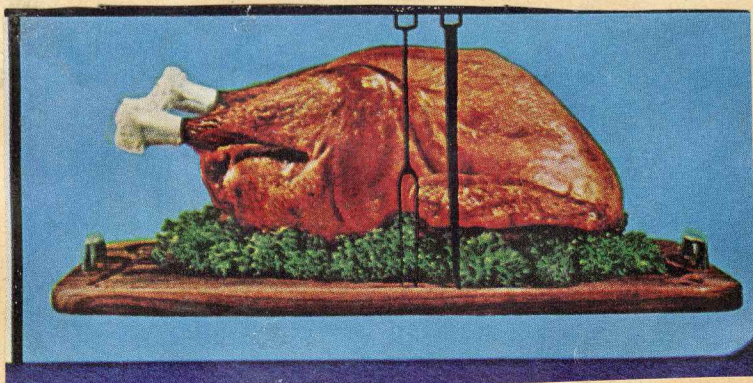

## Census study shows city population rises to 5,260

Meridian's population has been officially set at 5,260 following completion of a special census taken last week, Mayor Don Storey has announced.

The new population is more than double the figures determined in the regular 1970 census, and 25 per cent above the population figures determined in a special census taken in 1973.

Nevertheless, the new figure is slightly lower than what many city officials has been privately predicting. "We thought we had a little more residents than we do," Storey said.

The census showed that population in the new additions was up greatly, but that older residential areas near the inner city had lost population.

"We have about 700 lots in town that haven't been built on," Storey noted.

The increased population makes the city eligible for a wider variety of federal funding programs and larger amounts of those funds.

The cost of the census has not been determined yet, but it should run in excess of \$3,000. The Ada County Highway District is sharing in the cost of the census, since many of its funding programs are based on population.

# Vet day activities dedicate flagpole

With a large crowd looking on Thursday morning, the city of Meridian formally dedicated an 80-foot flagpole at the old city park during the Veteran's Day ceremonies.

The dedication followed brief speeches by a number of dignitaries, including former Meridian physician Dr. Joseph M. Thomas, whose financial gift to the city paid for the erection of the flagpole and the surrounding lights.

Thomas told the crowd, gathered to witness the dedication and honor America's war dead, "the history of our nation is filled with accounts of sacrifice made in war and obstacles surmounted in peace."

He noted the sacrifices made by women during wartime, praised local officials for the "unselfish acts" they perform in the discharge of their duties, and concluded with a poem praising the American flag.

Following music by the Meridian

High School band, representatives of various area veterans groups presented and raised the huge 12'x18' flag and the seven man honor guard fired three volleys in salute.

The ceremonies concluded with the playing of taps.

Organizations participating in the ceremonies included the Veterans of Foreign Wars, American Legion Post 113, Veterans of World War II, Boy Scout Troop No. 1 and the Meridian High School band.

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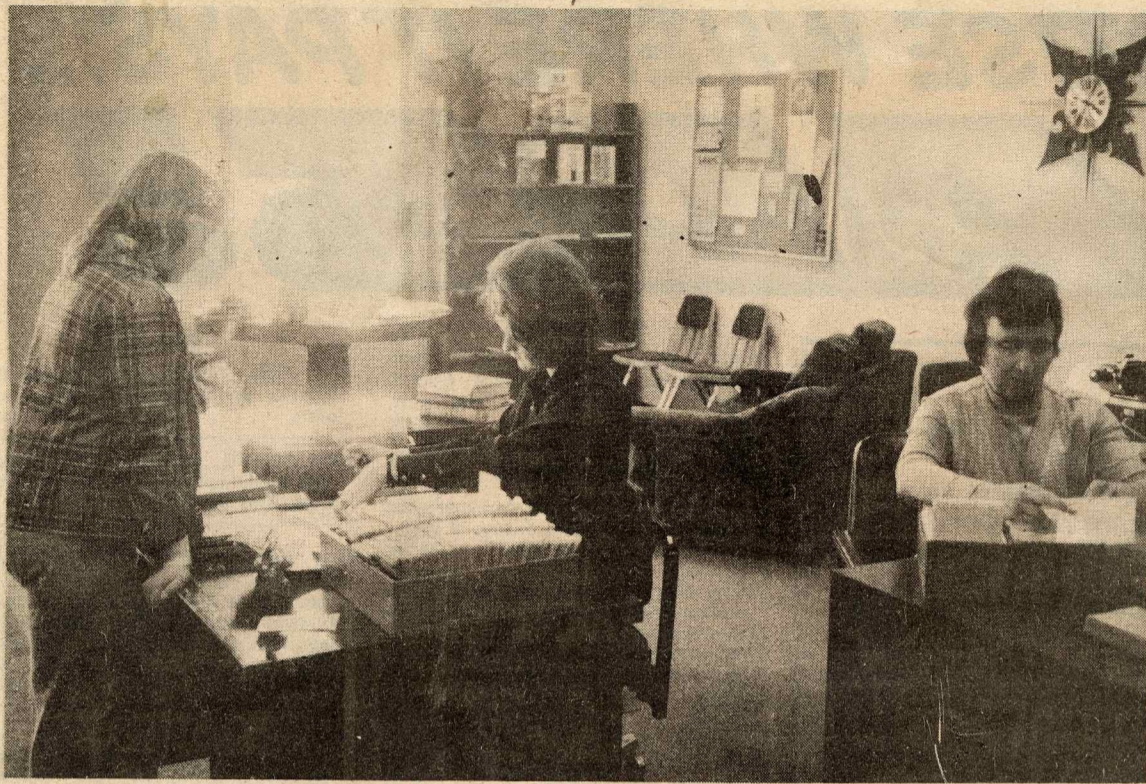
