



Over 70 floats, bands, antique cars, walking groups, horse riders, and drawn vehicles participated according to the sponsor, the Meridian Chamber of Commerce.





## Kelvin Delmont "K.D." Hartwell

K.D. Hartwell, 85, of Meridian, died Saturday at his home of cancer.

Funeral services were held Wednesday, June 16th, in Meridian United Methodist Church. Rev. Ralph A. Lawrence officiated. Burial followed in Meridian Cemetery. Arrangements were under the direction of the Chapel of the Chimes, Meridian.

K.D. was born June 30, 1907, at Salt Lake City, Utah, to Byron and Janie Dunn Hartwell. At the age of three he moved to Albion and later to Burley, where he graduated from high school. He attended Gooding College, a Methodist school, and graduated in 1931. He worked at the State School for the Deaf and Blind to help with his expenses while at Gooding.

K.D. was a star athlete in high school and college and held positions of student assistant and student body president. After graduation, he began his coaching and teaching career in Fairfield.

He married LaVerne Clark on June 5, 1932, at Union Oregon Methodist Church. In 1934, they moved to Meridian. Except for four yeas spent in upholstery training and work, his entire career was spent in the Meridian School District where he taught high school for 15 years and was a junior high principal for 20 years, retiring in 1972.

This year marked K.D. and LaVerne's 61st wedding anniversary.

In 1979 he was chosen as a Statesman Distinguished Citizen by *The Idaho Statesman* newspaper. K.D. was the first president of the Meridian Education Association, a member of the IEA, NEA, and long time member

and past president of Phi Delta Kappa, as well as a member of the Masonic Lodge. He worked with Boy Scouts and was amember of the Mtn. View Council. He was a 30-year member of the Lion's Club and past president of that group. He was a 58-year member of the Methodist church where he served on many boards and taught Sunday School for 20 years.

K.D. was a fine craftsman and loved refurbishing antiques, stream fishing, pheasant hunting, photography, and traveling. He and his wife traveled extensively in the U.S., Mexico, Canada, and several foreign coutries.

A kind, courteous, gentleman, K.D. was happy to help family, friends, and his community. A co-worker once described him as "a gentleman's gentleman."

Survivors include: his wife, LaVerne; a daughter and son-in-law, Rosalee and Bill Wigle; a son and daughter-in-law, Jack and Pat Day Hartwell; special loved ones Delbert and Betty Stevens; grandchildren: Scott and Cathy, Mike and Pam, Mark and Debbie, Jim and Vicki, Matt and Jean, and Chris and Toni Wigle; Kelly and Pam Hartwell-Beal; Marci Hartwell; Mike Stevens; Cheryl Stevens Geiger; and Jennifer Stevens; a brother-in-law and sisterin-law Leonard and Helen Marie Clark; 6 great grand children and several nieces and nephews. He was preceded in death by his parents, four brothers, a sister, and a beloved daughter,

# George Judd, after 40 years, retires as post office aide

After 40 years in the Meridian post office, George Judd, assistant postmaster, will put aside his walking shoes, polish up his traveling boots and retire from active duty next Monday.

Besides his long and outstanding

career in the post office, Judd is known throughout the Meridian area for his many civic and community activities and was selected several years ago as "Meridian's Man of the Year".

Traveling will be the first order

of business by Judd and his wife, Margaret, who retired at the end of the school term last summer after 19 years as an English teacher at Meridian junior high school. They plan to visit all three of their sons which is not as simple as it sounds, because it will include a trip to Beirut, Lebanon to visit their son, Gary.

'Taking it easy

They will start out, however, with visits to the other two, Roger, at Salem, Ore., and Gordon, at Fullerton, Calif.


In addition to their travels, Judd plans to catch up on his fishing and hunting and do a lot of "sitting back and taking it easy", which will be a novelty for a man who has been so active in so many things for so many years.

Judd came to Meridian in 1935 a mathematics teacher at Meridian high school and taught for the first four years he was here. In 1939, he accepted a position in the post office as a clerk and in 1956, when Meridian qualified as a first class postal office, he was made assistant postmaster, a position he has held ever since except for an interval when he was acting postmaster between the retirement of Frank Jolley, former postmaster, and the appointment of J. D. Petty, the present one

Active in Legion

During that time, he also served in the Navy during World War II and upon his return, he became a leader in the Meridian post of the American Legion and still is active in that organization.

# Hartwells are part of Meridian's spirit

One of the benefits of being a reporter is the interesting people one meets. K. D. and LaVern Hartwell are such people. Born in the early part of our century they struggled through the great depression, raised a family, and served the Meridian and Boise areas as dedicated teachers, volunteers, and neighbors. They have lived in Meridian since 1934.

Their story begins 84 years ago with K. D. being born in Salt Lake City in 1907 and moving with his parents to Albion, Idaho in 1910. Everything has changed since then, as K. D. explains, "at that time Albion was the county seat of Cassia county and Burley hadn't even been built yet."

Early on K. D. set his sites on college. To secure his goal he found himself "hooking beets." Using a machete like device with a hook on the end he "hooked beets and topped them individually. Then we tossed them into a 5-ton truck, for \$1.00 per load per worker." He

also worked with his father on their farm and later in a garage in Burley.

In high school K. D. was a bit of a star playing football, basketball, and track, the proof, "his picture was up there on the high school wall" says LaVern. He graduated in 1926.

LaVern Clark met him while they both were attending the Gooding Methodist College. K. D. graduated in 1931 with a BA in education. "He was quite a good athlete in basketball and in track," LaVern explained with a smile. They were married in

K. D. worked his way through college as a janitor for the state school for the deaf and blind and as a coach for the Fairfield football team. During the summers he worked in service stations. That time invested coaching would pay off later with one of the few jobs available in the depression years. So with his graduation from college he got

Before they were married LaVern had received a two year associate degree and was teaching at a county grade school in high, retiring in 1972. Fairfield. As she explained, "with the scarcity of jobs during that time my contract stated that if I was to marry I couldn't teach. My contract was for \$90 a month for seven months because they were cutting back during the depression." LaVern then became a full-time homemaker. At the age of 49, after raising her family, LaVern returned to college at Northwest Nazarene College and obtained a degree in elementary education. She then taught for 14 years in

In 1934 K. D. "traded jobs with a fellow named Harry Durall in Meridian, I coached and taught history and science." He taught in the old Meridian his first teaching and coaching rural high school on Carlton

position in Fairfield. Reflecting Street. K. D. remembers that "at years later, after "a hard time" he returned to teaching in Eagle. In 1962 he returned to Meridian as the principal of the junior

Today they still live in the house K. D. built in 1938. In the intervening years he has refurbished and restored antique furniture and some some upholstery work. But as LaVern says, "mostly we like to travel." And travel they have, they have been to all but five states, Europe, Australia, New Zealand, Canada, Fiji and Hawaii. Their favorite activity has been seeing the western states in their R.V.

In 1976 K. D. was the Stateman's Distinguished Citizen. The couple had three children Rosale, Norma and Jack. They have eleven grandchildren and 5 great grandchildren, and lots of friends.

K. D. and LaVern Hartwell are familiar names to many Meridianites, it is because of dedicated people like these two that Meridian is the nicest place in the valley.

There was a time when friends would yell, "Mr. Hartwell, you should slow down." K. D. Hartwell has slowed down a bit, but not too much! But, keep your eyes open for when the weather warms up you may still see K. D. striding through the town he knows so September 21, 1989
